FAMILY & KINSHIP RELATIONS - Miyeu Waahkooyoowin (good relations or being related in a good way)

- The family unit is the foundation of Métis culture
- ⊗ Kinship is central to Métis identity
- Centrality of kinship relations rooted in the fur trade where reciprocal relations developed over the Northwest
- Kinship relations reaches across time and space, linking people and communities throughout the 'Historic Métis Nation Homeland'
- Activities, assemblies, celebrations, festivals and events reconnect families (extended families and relatives)
- Throughout history ability to collaborate, hunt, tell stories and rejoice with each other, build our Nation





CULTURE AND LANGUAGE

- Métis emerged as a distinct people, who developed a unique culture, identity, language, way of life and political consciousness as a new Indigenous Nation in the Historic Northwest
- © Collective identity that was constituted through the struggles of the 19th century & that persists to this day as Riel's people
- Métis possess symbols of nationhood distinctive flag, national anthem, a unique language (Michif with various regional dialects), music and art
- Métis ways of knowing and "think from a Métis perspective"
- Acknowledging the individual and respecting the good of the collective
- Diversity of the Métis & other terms e.g., apitahwikosisan in Cree





LAND AND TERRITORY

- Deep connection to Land and the relationship between the Métis and the Land is a vital part Métis Self-Government
- Identity of the Métis Nation come from and are tied to the Land
- □ Land gives us our deep sense of place and our sense of self
- Share in the economy of our traditional territories
- Relationship with the Land occurs at both the physical and the spiritual level
- Secure Métis lands or land Rights, Economic Rights & negotiate Land Claims throughout Saskatchewan
- Harvesting is connected to our relationship to the Land & Independence





DEMOCRACY

- Commitment to fulfilling Riel & Dumont's vision of a selfgoverning Métis Nation within Canada and described in Michif as ka tipaymishooyahk (we who own ourselves)
- ⊗ Right to live as ka ishi pimaatishiyaahk (our way of life)
- Governance is based on the ballot-box system
- Exercising the right to live in freedom whereby Métis men and women can enjoy their civil, political rights, economic, social, language and cultural rights
- Constitution Act, s. 35 recognizes and affirms Métis as one of the three Aboriginal peoples of Canada
- Acknowledge that Métis people have struggled against often overwhelming odds to reclaim traditional Homelands and assert nationhood





IDENTITY AND CITIZENSHIP

- People are the foundation of the Métis Nation
- People are the citizens of the Métis Nation that share language, stories, community history and family relationships
- People hold collective memories of the past and share long term dreams for their children
- Strengthening individual identity and protection of the collective good and interests
- Understanding collective accountability and responsibility
- Each person alone is accountable and responsible for their conduct (e.g., respectful behavior, support of collective interests)
- Respect and uphold Métis cultural values & language





LEADERSHIP AND ACCOUNTABILITY

- Selection of leaders through a combination of deliberation, dialogue and representative democratic processes ensures the legitimacy of *ka niikaaniichik* (*those who lead us*)
- Trust, Respect and Transparency are essential to selfgovernment along with compassionate leadership
- Representation (local, regional, women & youth) begins at the community level through ballot-box elections
- Fostering balance of power among various components of government through assemblies and ballot-box elections
- Power invested in leaders must be continuously renewed by the people through elections, assemblies & other mechanisms





DUALITY OF RELIGION AND SPIRITUALITY

- Duality in beliefs is a reality for Métis spiritually minded and devoutly Christian
- Respect the right of freedom of thought, conscience and religion
- Miyeu maahkootoowin (good relations or being related in a good way) finds expression in opening and closing ceremonies, assemblies, gatherings with the involvement of elders, women and Locals
- Respect for conservation in harvesting and connection to the Land





FREEDOM AND EQUALITY

- Riel's vision of freedom for his people the freedom to live, trade and organize as Métis people...

- Equal rights of men and women to enjoy all civil and political rights
- Acknowledge the role of Métis women as 'mothers of the Métis Nation' as evidenced in historic and contemporary contributions to the Métis Nation as a whole





TRANSPARENCY AND AWARENESS

- Establish fair and open sharing processes and procedures in decision-making
- Transparency minimizes the opportunity for preferential treatment and the advancement of private interests over public good
- Respectful engagement and empowerment as a people and eliminate lateral violence
- Transparency and accountability in all environments
